Impending Engagements.

All the signs indicate impending conflicts at Vicksburg and at Charleston or Savannah. There is so much depending upon success at Vicksburg that a general feeling of anxiety, if not apprehension, prevails in reference to the impending engagement at that place.

The Army of the Potomac.

A scout in the Signal service, just from Maryland, reports, from personal observation, that the whole Yankee army is leaving Aquia Creek, the greater portion bound to Washington and the remainder to Old Point. The published object of this move is to "recruit and reorganize."

Interesting News from the Northwest.

The Northern Crisis (Jackson, Miss.) of the 11th learns from a distinguished gentleman from one of the Northwestern States that the States of Indiana, Illinois and Ohio have determined to stop the war and make terms of peace with the Confederate States at all hazards.

The Legislatures of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Kentucky will meet in General Convention at Frankfort (Kentucky) on the 18th of February (to-morrow) to agree upon the institution of a North-western Confederacy.

The terms of adjustment will be submitted for ratification to the people of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, at the ballot box. When thus ratified, separation from the U. States will be irrevocably perfected.

Lincoln's 150,000 Negro Soldiers.

Slavery being the proper condition of the African race, it may be that Providence is now using the madness of the abolitionists to return to slavery the "American citizens of African descent," as Lincoln denigrates them, who are now denizens of the North, for

Lincoln, with a million of men, now calls for the assistance of 150,000 Ethiopians.

As he cannot get them in the South, he will have to recruit them in the North, and so soon as they come within reach of the Southern army they will be captured, and be restored to the condition for which Providence designed them. The Feeling in Ohio.

A returned prisoner from Ohio, who arrived a few days since, reports that, after the adjournment of Court in Belmont county, Ohio, the Commonwealth's Attorney addressed the people in opposition to Lincoln's policy, and, at the conclusion of his speech, gave three cheers for the Union, and nothing is reported to detract it, save a successful rebellion of the enemy at Vicksburg.

Negroes Dying.

We learn that the citizens of Baltimore have refused to give employment to the negroes, they are being sent to Bladensburg, where they are dying at the rate of twenty or thirty per day.

When the Yankees first began to appreciate the stubborn fact that they could not conquer us by arms, they laid the "flattering unctious to their souls" that they could starve us to death, as they thought we raised little besides cotton.

The census of 1860, which has recently been published by the Lincoln Government, shows that besides rice, sugar and molasses, which the Yankees cannot raise at all, we have more of the staples of life in proportion to population than they have. It will thus be seen that if either country is to be starved, it will be the United States and not the Confederate States. It should be remembered, too, that the census shows the products before the war, and when the South was raising as much cotton as they could. Now, however, a great deal of the cotton land is planted in wheat and corn, which will greatly increase the amounts of these staples. The South is now raising more of the necessities of life than ever before, whereas the North is raising less, because a great proportion of their laboring population is in the army consuming instead of producing.
