The Yankees who landed from their transports and transports at the White House have already done some mischief. On Thursday evening a portion of the Federal troops—about 1,500—left the White House on the road to Hanover Court House, and upon arriving camped for the night on Col. Wickham's farm, where they captured Gen. W. H. F. Lee, who has been there since he was wounded in the battle of Brandy Station, on the 20th. They conveyed him away in the carriage of Col. W., which they also carried the first day. They also carried the first day of Col. Wickham, and one or two other officers.

The march began in the afternoon, and the South Anna River crossed at the bridge on the Central R. R., three miles from Hanover Junction, where they succeeded in doing by overcooming the guard of only 80 men, who offered a stout resistance, but were overpowered before reinforcements could reach them. Unfortunately, the force which had been guarding the bridge, and which would have been sufficient to protect it, the night before was sent to Gordonsville to repel an apprehended attack upon that place.

After striking the bridge, the Yankees started in the direction of the bridge on the Fredericksburg road, but on being informed by a citizen, who was a prisoner of theirs, that we had two brigades at that point and Hanover Junction, they turned their course, and marched back in the direction of the White House, passing Hanover Court House only a few minutes before the arrival of our reinforcements.

Information deemed reliable having been received at the War Department that about 80,000 Yankees under Keyes and Dix were marching up the Peninsula to attack Richmond, Gov. Letcher, on Saturday evening last, issued a proclamation urging upon the citizens of the State to perfect at once their military organizations to co-operate with the troops in the field.

What is the news from Lee's army? It is the question on the tongue of all our readers. We are sorry that we are unable to answer the question and to gratify the laudable curiosity of the public. The truth is, the "dogs of war," which Lee has unleashed are already "out of hearing," but that is only evidence that they are in close and warm pursuit of the game. Lee is not now planning on a large scale, and if the Yankees don't look very sharp, it will not be long before the "game will be up with them."

We are pleased to learn that our forces captured more prisoners, wagons, horse stores, &c., at Winchester, than we stated in our issue of last week. The Richmond Enquirer learns from a private letter to a gentleman of that city that we captured 4,700 men, 109 officers, 250 wagons, 400 horses, 20 ambulances, and all the public and private baggage, &c. Not a wheel escaped. Our men deserve all our country can award them.

The people say that Milroy went off in civilian's clothes—he left Winchester the evening before the assault. He who does that as a commander will do anything else.

The Yankees are in a terrible state of commotion, they cannot imagine what the rebels are about. Stuart has whipped their cavalry every day, and sometimes twice a day, ever since he left Chancellorsville. He has captured five or six hundred prisoners, Mosby caught Hooker's aids with letters of instructions to their cavalry commander. They showed that Hooker was very much perturbed.

Gen. Emboden with his brigade has been operating on the West of the forces of Gen. F. S. Lee, doing good service. On the 14th, he crossed the Shenandoah mountains to Moorefield, in Hardy county; sent back a fine drove of cattle; pushed on to Romney, the Federals, 1,500 in number, retreating to New Creek, a depot on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad. Onward he pressed to Strasburg, the enemy there also falling back to that strong position at New Creek.
