The Presidency.

We copy the following article advocating the nomination of Judge Black for the Presidency from the Somerset Democrat. It is one of several able articles on the same subject that have lately emanated from the same source.

Many good men have been misled as to the opinions of some of our distinguished statesmen. Judge BLACK, for instance, has been denounced as an advocate of extreme Southern doctrines, by certain presses and politicians.

HICKMAN knows this, and he utters his threats of coercion and conquest only because he wants to bring on a collision and a separation of the States, and get rid of a Constitution which stands between his constituents and their favorite pastime of slave-stealing.

Sherman the Hofferite. A thief named HELLER, who stole money from his employer in North Carolina and afterwards migrated to New York, published an Abolition book a year or two ago. This book advises the North to throttle slavery; to abolish slavery by force; and it calls upon all the non-slaveholders in the country, North and South, to have nothing to do with slaveholders.

Sixty-eight Republican members of Congress signed a recommendation of this work—cordially endorsed, and advised the people of the United States to purchase and read, a book that counseled one American citizen to put his knife to the throat of another—a book that told the slave it was his duty to rise in the night and murder his master, and violate the person of his mistress, and knock the brains out of every white child he could lay his hands on.
