President Lincoln and the War.

Mr. Estlin.—If you will permit me, through your columns, I would ask a few questions to be answered by the abolitionized portion of the Democratic party, not excepting that prince of jugglers, John W. Forney—or by any Republican; or, by "any other man."

If I find my communication stretching out too long for this number of your paper, I hope you will give me another, and another, hearing.

1st. Was not African Slavery an institution, in twelve of the thirteen British Colonies previous to the achievement of American Independence?

2d. Did not the Colonists hold their negroes as chattels?

3d. Was any change made in the character of the property (negro slaves) by the Constitution of the United States, or the Act of Congress of 12th of February, 1793, explanatory of Article IV, Sec. II, and III of the Constitution?

4th. Have not the terms "held to labor or service" been judicially construed to mean slaves?

5th. Are not the "citizens of any one State entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several States?"

6th. Who then dares say, that no man owning a negro, man or woman, ("who owes him service or labor") shall and may not remove from any State into any Territory belonging to the United States?

7th. If it be so that a slave owner, was considered a citizen, by the Patriotic fathers of the Constitution at the time that great State Paper was made, can such men as the Beechers, Greeleys, Stevens, Sumners, &c., &c., now Constitutionally read them out of any State, or any Territory or compel them to give up or relinquish any Constitutional right?

8th. If this war, which we all believed to have been waged for the maintaining of the Constitution, and laws of the Union, and for the common interest, comfort and well-being of the Anglo-American race, be changed in purpose and effect, who will "plead guilty at the day of Judgment?"

9th. Will President Lincoln, after deposing J. C. Fremont, allow that Bragat Bully Jim Lane to set nigger traps and travel the Country making abolition speeches?

10th. Does his excellency find a difference, between catering for the votes of a parcel of ignorant, fanatical abolitionists, and the administration of the Government under oath, and "according to the Constitution?"

Finally. When the power of the Country shall have been prostituted to the destroying of the Constitution, and laws which govern us; our senses, our patriotism, and our rights as freemen, will all have been destroyed, perverted or torn away and Constitutional liberty will have departed this earth, for ever!!

The members had hardly taken their seats before a dozen of them sprung up and pulled out a batch of resolutions relating to some negro grievance or disability, or directly proposing negro emancipation.

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Congressional.

WEDNESDAY, Dec. 11.

In the Senate, Messrs. Sumner and Fessenden respectively presented resolutions in favor of emancipating slaves by military authority. Mr Sumner also asked the action of the Senate on the old complaint of Francis A. Treadwell to the Supreme Court against Jefferson Davis and others.

In the House Mr. Pendleton, of Ohio, asked that the memorial of Messrs. Howard, Gatchel and Davis, the late Police Commissioners of Baltimore, be referred back to the Committee on the Judiciary, with instructions declaring that Congress alone has the power to suspend it.

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THURSDAY, Dec. 12.

In the United States Senate several petitions were presented, asking that all the slaves be set free—those of loyal masters with compensation—those of disloyal unconditionally.

In the House the greater portion of the session was occupied with a discussion on the resolution offered previously by Mr. Leroy, with reference to the proclamation of Gen. Halleck, which prohibited fugitive slaves from coming within his lines.

In the United States Senate a resolution was introduced by Mr. Fremont of Illinois, directing the Secretary of State to inform the Executive whether any person or persons in the loyal States had been arrested and imprisoned by his orders, and to point out by what law such arrests had been made.

Objection being made the resolution was laid over. A resolution passed by the House in favor of an exchange of prisoners was received and referred to the Committee on Military Affairs. Mr Chandler's resolution of inquiry into the expediency of appointing a joint committee of both Houses, for retiring improper or incompetent officers of the army and navy was discussed.

The report of the Secretary of the Treasury has been submitted to Congress. It has been anxiously expected, and its importance not over estimated.

It first refers to the measures already taken by the Secretary under the acts of Congress in the negotiation of loans, with the part course of which our readers are already acquainted.
