A DELEGATION TO WASHINGTON PROPOSED.

FORWARD MONROE, August 2.—The steamer Escort arrived this morning with news from the rebel States. The Raleigh Standard denounces Jeff Davis as a repudiator, in whom no confidence should be placed, and whose efforts to establish a Southern Confederacy will be a failure.

Lee's Army Massed Near Culpepper.

A RECONNOISSANCE AND A FIGHT.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, Aug. 2, 1862.—Gen. Buford's cavalry, artillery and a supporting infantry force crossed the Rappahannock at the railroad station yesterday, and then with his cavalry and artillery he proceeded towards Culpepper, driving Stuart's cavalry before him.

THE 26th and 27th regiments of the 1st Cavalry, and the 1st and 2nd regiments of the 1st Artillery, were engaged in a battle on Friday morning, near Aldie, by the 21st Massachusetts Cavalry. A skirmish ensued between the guerrillas and the regulars, but on the approach of the main body, Moore fled, closely pursued by the cavalry.
