STEAM NEWS.

From Charleston we learn that the enemy is evidently trying to make himself the proprietor of Morris Island. After skirmishing and skirmishing batteries Gregg and Wagner have been added to his armament, and its works, to guard the entrance to the harbor, part of the Island is now held by the forces recently transferred from South Island to Cummings Point notwithstanding our fire. Our batteries on James Island are actively engaged in shelling the enemy at night.

Our Mortars on Sullivan's Island work admirably. The shells are thrown with great accuracy, and lie in the middle of the enemy's battery almost every hour.

On Monday last for the first time for several weeks, two fire ships were fired from the batteries on Morris Island in the harbor of Port Sumter. The Tabular account of Sept. 22nd states that for want of information Harry just on Saturay Greg is very slow in consequence of the annoyance received from the rebel batteries Bee and Fort Morris by shot and shell fired at intervals of about twenty minutes, also that the preparations of Gen. Gilmore for shelling the city of Charleston were in a forward state which can be taken at any time. As regards the intentions of the Government the fact is ascertained that the fort is equipped with enough gunpowder to shell the city three times, and Gen. Gilmore eighty ships of which containing Greek fire.

In the army of Gen. Lee report says all sail of the fleet. Thirteen Yacht tickets were captured on Sunday near United States fort and sent through the lines, to Richmond. Seven descripts from Lane's (N. C.) brigade were shot at Orange C. H. on Saturday.

The enemy's force left the Harbor in expectation of 60,000 men, and the number of men are unknown.

Opposite Court House, Opinion is conflicting as to whether there will be a fight soon or not, but when it does take place we are satisfied Gen. Lee will be prepared to meet General Steele and give him a thorough casting down.

The latest intelligence from East Tennessee is that the Federals are encroaching that country—afterburning the Drakes at Carter's Station twenty miles from Bristol on the Virginia and Tennessee Railroad, on Saturday evening the rebels are now retreating out of Knoxville, the rebels have passed through the Cumberland Gap, Jonathan Donelson having left night.

A dispatch to the New York Times from Cincinnati dated September 26th says: "Gen. Thomas' corps was really the only one who had a difficult fight, Chickamauga, and the others, and Chattanooga, and Atlanta, and Orlinton, were driven in every direction, causing them to fall back to protect their front." On the second day the first charge made both Crittenden's and McClellan's, and routed their entire commands, driving them in a disorganized panic into Rossville and Chattanooga.
