THE BERALD ON THE RICHMOND ELECTIONS.

The following article from the New York Herald, of the 30th, in reference to the late election in Richmond, we transfer to our columns, deeming it a pretty fair view of the sentiments which influenced Augusta county, in the election of county officers on the 18th of July last:

"It is rather difficult for us to understand how the election of ex-rebel soldiers cas be legally prevented. Union men were put in nomination, but it seems that the people did not want them in office. This boing so, what are we to do? The mere fact of an election are we to do? The mere lact of an election presupposes the intention of the general gover-ment to allow the people to choose their own local rulers; and if they prefer rebel soldiers to Union men, we do not see how the matter can be helped at present. Indeed, the Goverment can have no voice in the affair, unless the President decide to violate the constitution in order to Leep ex-rebels out of official posiin order to keep ex-rebels out of efficial posi-tions. It must be reme mbered, however, that after all, this is a peroquestion of the records of the different candidates. There are no rebels now. The soldiers of Lee's army elected at Richmond have already taken the auth of allegisnee, and been pardoned, or, all least, they will do so before they hold their offices. These ceremonies, then, make them, omes. Inces ceremones, then, ma/e them, in the eye of the law, just as good Union men as the rest of us; and we hope that they will prove to be so in practice. ENIGRATION FROM THE SOUTH TO SOUTH AMERICA.—A letter from Richmond to the Pittsburg (Pennsylvania) Commercial gives the foll wing facts relating to an emigration

acheme now being gotten up in this city:

"An emigration scheme is now on foot here which has in view the organization of a sufficient number of Southerners to form a colony to settle on rich lands of Equador South America. It is a sort of mutual company, those to pay the cost of emigration who can, and those who cannot to be assisted by the other commigrants who have the means to spare. It is understood that donations of land are to be obtained from the government of that country by parties desiring to settle permanently there, besides other encourage-ments which will enable the new comers to ments which will enable the new comers to make a start. The company, I obderstand, are about to charter vessels for Tampico, whence they are to cross to Acaputco, on the Pacific side, there take-the Pacific sets to to their destination. The cost of emigration is estimated at about \$80°, for a man and his wife, with one or two children. I under-stand that the company now number a suffi-cient force to constitute cargoes for two or cient ioure to constitute cargoes for two or three vessels, and that negotiations will be immediately opened with the shipping firm of Williams & Guoin, of Now York, for the necessary ships.
