A SOUTHERN CONVENTION SUGGESTED.

A false impression in reference to the present dispositions and purposes of the Southern people prevails in the North, caused by the persistent declarations of the radical press and their evil disposed Southern correspondents, that the peo-ple of the South are still cherishing a spirit of rebellion. To correct this er-reneous impression the Memphis Commercial suggests the propriety of as bling a Convention of delegates from all the secoding States as early as prac-ticable, at Nashville or some other central point, for the purpose of placing the people of these States in their true position before the country and the world, as a people acquiescent in the rulings of fortune, submissive to Federal authority, anxious to resume the duties of Johnson of their united purpose to co-operate with him in the establishment of law and order and the maintenance of the national authority.

Since the "Spectator" Office was destroyed by Gen'l Hunter, we have not bad the pleasure of holding Editorial communion with the patrons and friends of this "old family Journal." The Herculean task of assorting "pi" and educing overe out of chaos conjuned all nal." The Herculean task of assorting "pi" and educing order out of chaos consumed all the time from the departure of Gen. Hunter to the arrival of Gen. Sheridan. The surreu-der of the Cenfederate armies, which occurred soon after, the extinction of the Confederate soon after, the extinction of the Confederate Government, and the consequent paralysis of all business and destruction of mail facilities, prevented us from remounting our editorial tripod at an earlier period. We do not know that our absence should be at all regretted, as the paper has been published by Messrs. STRABSBUG & ARGENBROHT, who, amidst difficulties which would have deterred persons of less energetic spirits, have conducted it with such ability, prudence and propriety, as to command the commendation of its numerous patrons.

Since we last guided the editorial pen great events have occurred. The greatest drama ever enacted upon the world's stage has been brought to a conclusion, and the Confederate Government which elicited so much hope, Government which elicated so much more, was sustained with such patriotic devotion, and was defended with such marked beroism, has, like a glorious vision of enchantment, incited into "air, thin air," and like

As is well known, we opposed, before the ar, every measure which tended in the slightest degree to weaken the bonds of the Union. Devotion to the Union, which we then con-Devoten to the Union, which we then considered, in the language of Washington, the packatian of our iberties," was the strongest political sentiment which we ever cherishder. We opposed secession with "might and main"—with "all our mind, soul and strength." We maintained, and thought that we had successfully established, upon the authority of the chief framers and exponents of the Constitution, that the chief-bject in changing the Government from that of the "Articles of Confederation" to that of the "Constitution of the United States" was the "Constitution of the United States" the prescreation of the Union. We denied the right, and of posed the policy of secession. We maintained that it was not a remedy for any of the evils of which we complained, but, on the contrary, that it would aggravite a thousand fold all the evils which its advocates claimed it would remedy—that it was not a constitutional, but a recodutionary right that it was not a peaceful, but a war rein

thas it would meure the protection of no Southern intercets ensure the protection of no Southern interests, but betray them all to destruction—that it would not secure additional freedom, but would probably quench in fratricidal blood tho vealaf flame of liberty, and leave us to grope our miserable way through the Cinmerian darkness of initiary despotant.

If it were wrong to be a friend of the Union

It it were wrong to be a friend of the Union before the war, then are we, and innoteen-twentieths of the good people of this country, not immeent. But whilst we were devoted to the Union and desired its preservation, we did not believe blood to be a proper coment, and were opposed to the exercise of military courcion. This was the view entertained by President Johnson, as expressed in a speech delivered by him in the Senate of the U. S. in Decomber, 1860 This was the view taken by the people of the South, and they thought they were justified in following their instinc-

they were justified in following their instinc-tive impulses to resist coercion.

We thought so, and though we have been defeated and are still governed by bayonots, yet we arow, boldly and fearlessly, that we cordisally supported the Confederacy in its struggle, giving it "aid and comfort." We lost all that we had saved of seventeen years these be invasting it. We will yield a cor-dial obelience to the "Constitution and laws passed in accordance therewith," but will claim and exercise the right to oppose by Constitutional means whatever law we may believe to be violative of the Constitutional rights of the citizens. No earthly power can force us to advocate a principle or policy which we may disapprove.

We maintain that the citizens of the South should be restored as soon as possible to all the rights, privileges and immunities of citi-zens of the U. S.—that they should be res tored to all the rights they possessed before the war. We will sedulously maintain the just rights of the citizens and labor to have heir birth right restored to them, for
