BREMEN, JAN. 15.

MY DEAR SIR: I have the pleasure to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20th December, and avail myself of the first opportunity to express my thanks for the interesting intelligence which it communicates.

In my parlor is suspended an engraving of Mount Vernon, and in my front hall a picture of General Washington, which ennobles Mrs. Washington and Miss Custis. My eyes love to linger upon those faithful memories of other years.

ADELTERATION OF LIQUORS.
