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COLORED PREACHERS IN THE SOUTH.

In reprinting the account of the "color ed pastor for white people" in Giles county Texas, which recently appeared, the Co mmon (St) Sun, adds:

This calls to mind an instance of a negro preaching to white congregations who once under our observation in our days in the vicinity of Huntsville, Ala. The Rev. Mr. Allen, of the Presbyterian denomination, a man of fine literary attainments and the principal of the "Grove Academy," in Huntsville, at that time owned a negro servant whom he had educated, and who, showing a pious disposition and inclination to preach, he instructed in divinity. When some Allen was going out from home to preach on Saturday, and Sunday he took the boy with him as a body servant. They occupied the pulp together, and the negro frequently gave out the hymn and offered up the opening prayer, and after the pastor concluded his sermon, often closed the service with an exhortation. After a few years, he frequently took the minister's place in his pulpit, and in case of his minister's indisposition, filled his appointments. He often preached in Huntsville to full and anxious congregations, and it finally became a matter of dispute among the officials as to which was the best preacher.

The Charleston Courier adds the following, related by a friend, who attended country church in one of the upper districts on an occasion of service by a colored preacher, who enjoyed the confidence of all, and the unbounded admiration of colored friends. After the services of a visitor, who was one of a large proportion of white hearers, questioned many of the colored hearers, in order to learn the opinions and comments on the sermon, as a preacher generally. A veteran colored leader was asked, among other questions, "Who is the best preacher you have ever seen, and who draws the largest congregations?" and, after some consideration and reflection, the answer was—"You know, mass we all try to get out on circuit preaching days when we see, but the biggest congregations always come when Dr. _____ is in the house to preach."

MOUNTAIN MEADOWS MASSACRE.

It will be remembered that some time ago a company of one hundred emigrants on their way from Arkansas to California were massacred at Mountain Meadows, the Indians, as was reported; but various subsequent developments have established the conviction that these were merely two of the hundreds of the Mormons themselves. An eye witness of the transaction has been found at last, and the San Francisco Bulletin has received, from an official source a full statement, a statement of account of the affair. He says the massacre was his design and carried into execution to get possession of the thirty wagons and seven or eight hundred head of cattle belonging to the emigrants. His statement, which is as follows, reveals a most shocking exhibition of cruelty and crime. That civilized beings could be guilty of such conduct, seems hardly credible:

"While I was residing at Cedar City I was called upon by Messrs. Isaac High John D Lee, and John Higbee—all three Mormon military officers—to go a few miles out south of the city, which I did. There I found thirty or forty others, selected from different settlements. We were addressed by the above officers, who told us that they had sent Canah, the Paravat Chief, with his warriors, to destroy the Arkansas company, and that if we had not done it we must; and that if any of us refused, or betrayed them to the Americans, they would take good care of him hereafter. Here we were all ordered on the quick march to the Mountain Meadows, where we found the emigrants with their wagons formed into two circles, to defend themselves against the merciless and blood-thirsty savages, who lay around in ambush, killing them as opportunity presented.

"Night and Lee formed their men into two companies, and made a precipitate rush at the poor defenceless victims. The men inside of the circles rose up, but instantly fell dead or mortally wounded, under the fire of the wretches who so cruelly sought their lives. Nothing remained to be done, except to kill the frightened females and their innocent children clasped in their arms. Others along with desperation to their bleeding, dying husbands pleading in vain for mercy at the hands of the "Christians" who controlled the no more savage Indian assassins.

"John D. Lee now sent to the Indian chief and his men to ambush to come out and finish the survivors, directing him to spare only the little children, who could not talk. The savages came instantly, with knives drawn, and speedily finished the bloody work. The scene beggars description. The demonic yells of the savage monsters, mingled with the shrieks and prayers of helpless mothers and death, tears, while the death blows were dealing with unflinching hands, and souls were torn from their bodies which bloomed with beauty and innocence but a few hours before. Now the work of butchery ended. The wretches threw the dead into two large, wooden boxes slightly with earth, and hid away to find the women and little of prey, and returned home with their hands of murder, blood, and a good quantity of goods, etc.

TAKING EXERCISE.

In the May number of the Atlantic Monthly is a very useful article on the gymnasium, written by Dr. David W. Chandler. Everything which calls the attention of those who lead a city life to the importance of physical cultivation, will do as much good to the race as all that tends to the development of the intellect does for those classes whose occupations are most entirely physical and laborious. In the daily attrition of city life the mind wears out the body, the sword wears through the scabbard; the ends of the nerves get laid absolutely bare, while the base and muscle, which make a strong man and a healthy woman, are at terly neglected. This deterioration goes on in each generation increasingly, until the cause of it is discovered and counteracted by proper physical cultivation. The body can be cultivated and trained quite as much and as successfully as the mind, and the neglect of such cultivation will show itself as obviously in the one case as in the other.

The greatest fault of our city culture is that it is too one-sided—too exclusively intellectual, and too little either physical or moral. Perhaps it is one of the most hopeful features of the present time, in this respect, that the old English and European gymnasiums are coming into vogue amongst us. Fencing, bas, of late, been taken up in Boston with great vigor, as suitable for a winter exercise, and we hope it may be extensively cultivated. But skating, both for gentlemen and ladies, is the best of all preventative of consumption. It expands the chest, and invigorates the limbs. At a time when fully one fourth of all the deaths in this living in cities arise from diseases of the lungs, let the sedentary folk shun chess and take up with a good skating partner, in winter, if they want to preserve health. Robustness of constitution is the main thing to be formed by all the recreations of these whose occupations are sedentary and confining. The only question that remains, is whether exercise, for the sake of exercise, erases the good that might be effected by an equal amount of exercise with an ulterior purpose. The common opinion is that the first does no good. But in one respect it is far more benefit than the involuntary and unthoughtful exertions that arise in the course of every man's daily duty or pleasure, it fixes the attention of the performer upon the connection between exercise and health. It gives him faith in making his arrangements for this, and the feeling of conscious power, so that his life and health are in a certain sense in his own keeping.

Another advantage of the gymnasium, is that it enables a man to study more accurately the particular muscles that need to be developed, and direct all his exertions so as to exercise them. When a man once learns how much can be effected in the way of development of the body by judicious efforts, he has got more than half way to a cure of a thousand of the ills that life is heir to. We have known sedentary men to increase the circumference of the chest from one to two inches in a few weeks, by simply filling the lungs by sucking through a tube gradually and gently through a quill or reed.

When this consciousness of power over ourselves is once obtained the more naturally our exercise grows out of our business or recreation the better of course. A game of cricket at this season, which will expand the arms and legs and lungs, will then be far better than any amount of exercise for its own sake. The cultivation of a garden, a brisk canter on horseback, or drive into the country, to break in a wild colt, will produce the most striking effects on the health and happiness. The chief danger is lest they take up so much time and become so interesting, that a man is in danger of becoming a mere horse jockey, or cricket player, or amateur gardener. It is well, therefore, for every man to study to take exercise in the way of his business and profession. Nearly all can do this. Let the merchant go to market before breakfast, and fetch and carry his own letters to and from the post, instead of sending a clerk. It will often save him from being robbed, and give him habits of exercise daily, so as to save the necessity of a visit to the sea shore or Saratoga to recruit. Many a preacher has found the physical benefit of prosing a very animated discourse in a loud tone of voice, and the lawyer will find a little daily pleading quipped his power of study. Many physicians contrive, in London, to let their carriage drive on slowly empty while they walk to the places where they have to visit. In this way nearly all may contrive to make their duties afford them exercise, even if living in the heart of a city.
