that no American can witness it without a feeling of intolerable shame.

Expatriation includes not only emigration out of one's natural country, but naturalization in the country adopted as a future residence.

There can be no doubt that naturalization does, pro facto, place the native and adopted citizen in precisely the same relations with the government under which they live, except so far as the express and positive law of the country has made a distinction in favor of one or the other.

In some countries immigration has been so encouraged by giving to adopted citizens certain immunities and privileges not enjoyed by natives.

In regard to the protection of our citizens in their rights at home and abroad, we have no law which divides them into classes, or makes any difference whatever between them.

There have been, and are now persons of a very high reputation, who hold that a naturalized citizen ought to be protected by the government of his adopted country everywhere except in the country of his birth.

Neither is this view supported by the practice of the world. I need not say that our naturalization laws are opposed to it in their whole spirit as well as in their express words.

A Mr. Amshar, a native Bavarian, after being naturalized in America, and living here for many years, determined upon returning to his native country and re-assuming his original political status.

Ernst in his dominions, and compel them to fight for him, he certainly had a right to hang them for fighting against him.

But Mr. Madison denied this whole doctrine and all its consequences. He immediately issued a counter proclamation, declaring that any naturalized citizen of the United States should be put to death on the pretence that he was still a British subject.

The application of these principles to the case of any naturalized citizen who returns to his native country, is simple and easy enough. He is liable, like any body else, to be arrested for a debt or a crime, but he cannot be actually punished for the non-performance of a duty which is supposed to grow out of that allegiance which he has abjured and renounced.

But it may be said that the Government of Hanover has a right to make her own laws and execute them in her own way. This is strictly true of all laws which are intended to enforce the obligations and punish the offences of her own people.

Hanover probably has some municipal regulation of her own by which the rights of expatriation is denied to those of her people who fail to comply with certain conditions. Assuming that such a regulation existed in 1851, and assuming also that it was violated by Mr. Ernst, when he came away, the question will then arise, whether the unlawfulness of his emigration makes his act of naturalization void as against the King of Hanover.

Some may think us extravagant in our estimate of Judge BLACK's abilities, but our conviction is every day growing stronger that he is the fortunate possessor of the mightiest intellect now existing in the Western hemisphere.

The Pittsburgh Post on the Presidency.

We transfer to our columns an article from the Pittsburgh Post, arguing closely and strongly in favor of the re-nomination of President Buchanan. No one can fail to appreciate the patriotic motive, and yield to the cogent reasoning of the writer, but we are compelled to regard the suggestion as placed beyond the possibility of present consideration, however desirable it would be to the country and the party. This impossibility arises solely from the emphatic declaration, time and again made by Mr. Buchanan, that the end of his present term should close his public career. We cannot complain of this determination, however much we may regret the loss thus occasioned to the councils of the nation at a time, too, when the ability and voice of an experienced sage and statesman are so eminently required. We think that Mr. Buchanan has a right to claim a relief from further service. Whilst we must readily agree both in the reasoning and the conclusions of the Post, we have not the right to gainsay or complain of the determination of Mr. B. in this respect. He has been in the public service nearly fifty years; a brilliant member of a profession, in which the greatest eminence and splendor of fortune awaited him; he relinquished all its honors and emoluments at an early period of life to assume public trust; his private affairs have ever been secondary, and at the ripe age of over-thirty years he will leave the public service without a blemish upon his character, and beyond the completion of an imagined departure from the strict line of integrity and duty. Such an exalted character and noble public worth and service would ordinarily, and should always, command a public name from posterity, yet the Free Editor, by John W. Forney, has advised upon his deathbed persons to withdraw as a new course should show a new means of escape. Responsible in every sense, a prolific language if ever in mortal, he declines to do with liberality, to express the character and motives of a man who is not only an citizen beyond reproach, but in a public sense his country and its commensurate representative of the honor of the Nation. The man, too, who has been a Democrat, and whose people will not so soon, yet he, Forney, does in every
