The John Brown Party.

The Republican leaders in general, alarmed at the reaction in public sentiment occasioned by old JOHN BROWN'S reduction of Republican principles to practice, have loudly protested their disapproval of the invasion of Virginia.

It was the money of "freedom shrieking" Black Republicans that furnished BROWN with arms and ammunition wherewith to slaughter the peaceful inhabitants of Harper's Ferry.

And what has been the conduct of Republicans in official position who have been compelled to show their hands? Several of BROWN'S fellow-murderers made their escape.
