The Republican Candidate.

It is but a few years since many of the most prominent members of the Republican party of Pennsylvania pronounced SIMON CAMERON "a head and shoulders taller in political infamy than any other man living," and denounced the caucus that nominated him for United States Senator "a bazard feast."

The declaration was not made without a struggle to prevent it. There were men in the Republican Convention whose sense of honor would not permit them to touch this leprous politician. They painted his character in its true light, and frankly and boldly said that if he were thrust down their throats, they would "spew him out."

But a majority yielded to the seductions of the owner of the Middletown Bank and bound the Republican party of Pennsylvania to his support at Chicago.

Do our opponents comprehend the degrading position they occupy with CAMERON as their candidate? Who and what is SIMON CAMERON? He has belonged to all parties and cheated all parties. For a view of his career as a political swindler we need not go back of the year 1854.

While the finger of scorn is pointed at the party which accepted this "buz-zard" for its leader, justice ought to be done to those individual members of that party who refused to swallow the dose.

The public in general have no just conception of the handling CAMERON got from a few honorable men in the Republican Convention. That part of the proceedings was suppressed by the reporters for CAMERON's paper at Harrisburg. The speeches in CAMERON's favor were taken down and published, but when a member of the Convention spoke against him, the reporters dropped their pens.

Louisiana Convention.

The Democratic Convention of the State of Louisiana met last week and elected delegates to the National Convention. No instructions were given to the delegates, but a resolution declaring Hon. JOHN SLIDKILL eminent ly qualified for the Presidency was adopted by the decisive vote of 2003 against 34.

This would seem to be a proper occasion to allude to the reprehensible attempts which have been made by certain papers to create the impression that the distinguished Senator from Illinois is strong at the South. These papers have time and again asserted that Mr. DOUGLAS would be sustained by a number of Southern States, and they have claimed Louisiana with the utmost confidence.

The day that was to test these assertions finally came round, and on summing up the result it was found that of the twenty-eight delegates elected in New Orleans, five were for Mr. DOUGLAS and twenty-three against him.

We do not state these facts for the purpose of injuring Mr. DOUGLAS. We desire to make no assault upon him. But we wish to disseminate correct information. Some very good people here and elsewhere are being deceived by the false representations of such journals as FORNEY'S Press, the Washington States and the Chicago Times.

We have felt enough interest in the Presidential question to induce us to "keep the run of it" pretty well, and we are not able to see where Mr. DOUGLAS will get more than about half enough of votes to secure his nomination. We do not expect him to receive the support of any Southern State at Charleston.

The truth about this matter ought to be known to everybody. Mr. DOUGLAS is entitled to all the friends and all the capital that can be made up for him by fair means, but the attempts of the papers named to manufacture for him a degree of popularity that he does not enjoy, ought to be frowned upon by every honest Democrat.

But although we know Mr. DOUGLAS to be weak in the States from which our majorities must come, and to be a very undesirable nominee at the present time we wish to see him not only fairly but even generously treated at Charleston.

While the Republican managers of Pennsylvania are talking about a protective tariff and holding up CAMERON as the tariff candidate for the Presidency, the Republicans of other States are busy electing delegates to Chicago who are in favor of the nomination of free traders.

States. These are all unfriendly to protection, and being strong enough to control the nomination, they will force the Republicans of Pennsylvania to swallow BARNARD, BANKS or CHASE, neither of whom is a tariffite.

Pennsylvania All Right.

The Democracy of Pennsylvania will enter upon the approaching political campaign with the most cheering prospects of success. The harmonious and conciliatory action of the Reading Convention has closed up every breach in our ranks, and from all quarters of the Commonwealth the news comes up that "all is well."

These demonstrations have struck the heart of the opposition with terror. They read their fate in the spectacle of a cordially united Democracy. They no longer scoff at the idea of the election of the Charleston nominee. They feel that Pennsylvania is about to resume her station in the Democratic ranks, and well do they know that "as goes Pennsylvania so goes the Union."

Since the nomination of Gen. FOSTER as the Democratic candidate for Governor, the more sagacious leaders of the opposition see the great mistake they made in permitting CAMERON to set up Mr. CURTIS. They know that CURTIS is not the right man to put against the Democratic nominee.

This fellow CURTIS has not the shadow of a claim to the character of a statesman. He was lifted up from obscurity by the Know Nothing swell of 1854, and when that wave subsided he fell to his former level. And there he would have been permitted to remain, had not CAMERON thought that he might be made servicable in whipping the bolters of 1855 into the Winnabago council.

Run up this Flag! In the course of an earnest and argumentative speech in Connecticut, Hon. Dwight W. Pardee, thus alluded to the aspect of the Connecticut branch of the sectional party and the work which the Democracy have before them:

Enthusiasm is a good thing, but enthusiasm alone will not carry us successfully through the contest before us. We have here in Connecticut a small Chesapeake—a bill composed of very dark hair—[expressions of laughter and applause]—it waves a flag which was its former times a flag of the Union, but which in these latter years has had stricken from it all the fifteen stars, and their place is filled by a piece of black cambric. [Laughter.] The walls of that fortress will not come down by the blowing of horns; that method of attack did very well at Jericho, but will not do for Connecticut. [Laughter.]

That's just the process that is needed also in the Chapultepec of other States. Run up the Union Flag and see to it that it waves in triumph. A Washington correspondent of the New York Tribune says of Senator Seward's speech on slavery:

"It was the sternness of a man whose sharply defined features spoke that stern, pronounced twenty years ago, then found false colors, but which have been re-erected until they have become the creed and rallying cry of a party on the eve of assuming the control of the national government." The writer is a bad prophet, though he is right in his political genealogy. Twenty years ago Seward issued a fanatical summons for the North to put itself in a state of aggression on slavery, and left the infamous treason statutes of many Republican States at its success.

American Citizens to Cuba.

HAYRA, Friday, Feb 25, 1860. The time approaches when Spain and the United States will have to determine the question of the nature and extent of the rights of the subjects or citizens of either, who may be naturalized under the laws of the other. The case of Daxino de Liano is an example of the necessity of coming to some conclusion on this subject.

That the attempt to enforce upon Liano the Spanish conscription law, by exiling military service to the nation of Spain, or an equivalent for a substitute, is a violation of the rights of the subject, and that the American Government should not be required by the American Government to place upon the person of Liano the conscription, and that his assumed obligations to provide a substitute, be cancelled, and no money paid by him for such purposes.

To the Council General of Spain. The application of Consul General Helm, Gen. Navarro replies by asserting that Spain does not release her born subjects who go abroad and become naturalized citizens of other countries, from the obligation of military service or that the obligation of military service of her subjects, be cancelled, and no money paid by him for such purposes.

From Arizona. The forbearance of our citizens at the repeated depredations of the Apaches has ceased, at length there is a prospect of some decisive being done to check their frequent incursions. Captain R. S. Ewell, at present commanding Fort Buchanan, was en route for Aniva, in company with the Director of the mine and he has received intelligence of the robbery of cattle from Arizona ranches, which he formed up a last week, and immediately resolved to head an expedition against the Apaches.
