The Result.

We need scarcely tell our readers, at this late day, that the result of the election in this State is unfavorable to the Democratic party. We frankly admit that we were never more sanguine of success and never more sadly disappointed. We thought we had made all due allowance for the unscrupulous activity of our opponents—their perfect organization—the amount of money to be used—their numerical strength, all these things we had noted; but it seems we omitted in our calculations an important item—the one that wrought our defeat—the amount of treachery in our own ranks. We were not prepared for this stab in the back. It is evident we have been slaughtered by the friends in our own household. The straight-out Douglas faction under the lead of the arch traitor Forney has again played us false and for the third time given the State into the hands of the Republicans. To the machinations of this faction we are indebted for our defeat. Their disorganizing efforts have once more stricken down the Democratic party and they are now rejoicing with the Republicans over their hellish work. To say that we do not feel chagrined at the result would be sheer affectation, but to set down and lament over it would be folly. Let us close up our broken columns and go to work to retrieve what we have lost. We know the quarter in which the treachery lies and we may now, in some degree, guard against it. Let the true Democracy of the country stand up manfully and battle it down. Let us, hereafter, hold no fellowship with traitors or those who are consorted or controlled by them. It is not yet too late to redeem the State if we purify our ranks of the traitors and disorganizers who still retain a foothold in the party for the purpose of doing mischief. Get rid of them and the Democratic party will again roll up one of her old fashioned majorities and come out of the contest triumphant. Let us not off from the party every disorganizer who will not support the regular Electoral Ticket, formed by the Democratic State Convention, and no other. We will not allow quarrelling among ourselves and be unable to keep the organization of the party pure and undivided. Democrats be not discouraged—pick your fists and get again—we are beaten but not conquered.

Converts to Republicanism.

The Transcript announced just previous to the late election, for the gratification and encouragement of its political friends, that D. WATSON, Rowe and Wm. S. EYBARRT, Esq., of this borough had deserted the Democratic party and joined the Republicans. It paid a high complement to the character and talents of these gentlemen, and dwelt very particularly upon their prospect of advancement among their new friends, as if this might have been among the considerations that carried them over and it was necessary to assure them publicly that their reward would in due time be forthcoming.

If we had not known how closely straight-out Douglasism was allied to political John Brownism, we could not have believed the story of Mr. Rowe's defection, except it had come from his own lips. He had everything to attach him to the Democratic party. His father had been a leading Democrat for many long years—had represented this county, through the partiality of its Democratic voters, in the Legislature of the State—had been elected by the Democracy of the whole commonwealth to the office of Surveyor-General—was re-nominated for the same office, and would have been re-elected but for a combination against him of the same Republican and straight-out Douglas parties to which the son has now given his adhesion!

But the course pursued by pretended friends of Douglas here and elsewhere had pretty well fortified us against surprise at any desertion from our ranks that might occur. Indeed the course of Douglas himself had prepared us for changes. For more than two years he had separated himself from all his Democratic colleagues in the United States Senate, and from nearly all the Democratic members of the House, and during all that period he had waged a bitter and vindictive war against a Democratic administration, assailing its prominent members with all the fierceness and vulgarity of his coarse and brutal nature.

The history of this country does not record the case of a prominent Democrat waging war against a Democratic administration and yet remaining true to the Democratic party. If we go back to JACKSON'S day, we find that all the leading Democrats who took sides with BRIDLE and his Bank, slid off with their followers into the ranks of the Whigs. If we come down to the Presidency of Mr. POLK, we find WILMOT, a Democratic Representative of Pennsylvania in Congress, first separating from his party on a single question, and that the very one DOUGLAS has gone off on, (slavery,) and then going over, bag and baggage, to the enemy, and carrying with him the whole Northern tier of counties, which before his desertion were strongly Democratic. Descending to the time of Mr. PIERCE, we find such men as Judge Trumbull, of Illinois, (now the colleague of Douglas in the Senate,) first condemning the Nebraska bill, and finally splitting off altogether from the Democrats and joining the Republicans, carrying with them, of course, all their warm friends and admirers.

With these facts in our memory, where they will remain forever imbedded and warn us of the peril of assisting the opposition in their hue and cry against a Democratic administration, we were long ago prepared to see a goodly number of professing Democrats go over to the Republican party. It did not, therefore, in the least surprise us when the rumor became current that Mr. Rowe, the Secretary of the Douglas Club of this borough, had become a convert to Black Republicanism. He simply followed straight-out Douglasism to its logical conclusion. He went at one leap where others with more cunning but less honesty are going by a more circuitous route. He has already 'brought up' where the great bulk of malignant Douglas straight-outs, with Forney at their head, intend to halt and pitch their tents—in the camp of the enemy. We do not admire his choice, but we applaud his boldness and candor, so different from the sneaking hypocrisy of others, whose minds are no less firmly made up to leave us than his, but whose nature is not manly enough to permit them to go by an open road.

Let us not be misimpressed. We impute no treacherous designs to the great body of Mr. Douglas's followers. Those of them who intend to vote for the Reading National Ticket have so,

we are sure, the remotest intention of deserting our party. They are good and true Democrats, and they have given the most striking proof of their loyalty by refusing to allow themselves to be led off from the regular organization by the traitors and knaves who have set up a straight-out ticket. They are in no danger of becoming Black Republicans. They form so part of the twenty thousand traitors who, with professions of superior devotion to Douglas or their lips, voted straight-out for Curtin, and against Henry D. Foster, a Douglas man to make the State sure for Lincoln, and help pare men like Stevens and Cameron to "rob the corruption of the National Administration."

But we are neglecting Mr. Everett, who is worthy of distinguished consideration. He was a Whig in 1854, a Know Nothing in 1854, in a transition state in 1855, a Republican in 1856, a Democrat in 1857, half-and-half in 1858, on the fence in 1859, and again a Republican in 1860. Our joy is great that he has found a resting-place at last. Peace to his ashes, Let Rankin pray.

Forney Straight out for McClure.

We clip the following from the political bell-wether of the Times and its indorers, the Philadelphia Press of Saturday last:

The Committee of the People's party, under the energetic management of Hon. A. K. McClure, presented a striking contrast to their opponents. They were in the main, men of high character and high ability. They appeared almost as a hopeless case, in view of the defection of the Bell men, and the general desertion among all ranks of the Democracy to the support of Foster, and a legitimate method of attracting popular support. The services of the best orators of the State and of the country were secured. An immense number of donations were distributed. Every township was visited, and every district completely organized. In all this time, Colonel McClure has performed a most important part, and while we have no right to a disposition to interfere with the distribution of any honors or rewards which may result from the Republican triumph, we think it is not too much to say that effective political aid should be properly rewarded by the State when he is served.

Certainly. But give out the whole programme. Don't let your sympathizing Democratic friends, to whom you say the Republicans "are indebted for the result over which they are now exulting," remain in the dark as to the rewards to be dispensed to "faithful and effective political soldiers." You have come straight out for the gallant Colonel—now tell your sympathizing friends straight out that you proposed to send him to the Senate of the United States.

Perhaps you might as well add another interesting bit of information. Tell your readers straight out that the arrangement is that Col. McClure shall succeed Gov. Bigler on the fourth of March next and that the Chevalier Forney shall walk straight in at the expiration of Gen. Cameron's term two years later. Nice arrangement. Guess it will have "the sympathy of thousands of honest Democrats."—When carried out, don't forget those to whom you are 'indebted for the result,' the "faithful and effective political soldiers" who are following you straight out of the Democratic party. You may have a Supreme Judgeship at your disposal some day, a snug asylum for worn out "political soldiers." But look out for Simon when the Bell rings and the conductor says wiggle-waggle.

Retracting their Friends.

Forney & Co., at Philadelphia, Leaman & Co., at Reading, and Haldeman & Co., at Harrisburg, firms doing a heavy business in the straight-out trade, are said to have won an immense amount on Curtin's election. A great deal of it was won off the honest portion of the Douglas men, who did not suspect the treachery of their leaders and therefore staked their money on Foster. The gains of Forney, Leaman and their associates in this gambling operation are set down at sixty thousand dollars. Straight-out Douglasism pays pretty well at that rate.

The Election Returns.

The official returns for Franklin County will be found in this week's paper. The official vote of the State has not yet been received—enough is known, however, to indicate that the State has gone for Curtin by about 50,000 of a majority. In this Legislative District Averis is re-elected by about 400 of a majority. Hammer's vote is something less. McClure is re-elected in October—his majority in the District being about 400. The official returns will be published in due season.

Regular Deception.

There are many honest Democrats who have been grossly deceived into supporting STANLEY A. DOUGLAS. They were in the first instance led astray by the cry of "regular nomination," and, like true Democrats, felt it duty bound to give him their adherence believing him to be such. Many have discovered their mistake on this point and have abandoned him. To make a regular nomination requires the concurrence of two things—first, the necessary vote of the representatives of the party; and, second, THE LARRY TRICKS. Neither of these has Mr. Douglas obtained. It required the vote of two-thirds of the delegates in the nominating convention to make a regular candidate. That vote would have been 202. Mr. DOUGLAS did not and could not, get upon any ballot, more than 181. It is, therefore, absurd for him, or his friends, to claim that he received the necessary vote of the representatives of the party to make him the regular nominee. In the second place the party has never accepted him as its candidate. In many States he will not even have an electoral ticket, while in the balance the largest and most reliable portion of the party are supporting BRECKINRIDGE. It is in fact now conceded by many of his friends that he cannot obtain the electoral vote of a single State in the Union. This we believe to be his true standing in the party. How then, in the name of common sense, are we to view him as the regular nominee of the Democratic party? It exhibits a great want of sense, or else a propensity to practice deception, in any one to urge the plea of regular nomination in behalf of Mr. DOUGLAS. That is now placed in the category of exploded humbugs and no sensible Democrat will any longer be deceived by it.

In regard to his principles the party have been even worse deceived than in the matter of his nomination. They were led to believe that his opponents were a "disunion squad." Many who are not wilfully blind have had their eyes opened to this deception. They find their leader linked on the same ticket with the rankest Disunionist of the South, and the leading Douglas papers openly advocate Disunion in the strongest terms. We make the following extract from the Atlanta, (Ga.) Confederacy, a zealous Douglas paper, and yet Mr. NILL in his speech before the County Convention, had the effrontery to attempt to fasten this very disunion movement, here so boldly proclaimed, on the supporters of Mr. BRECKINRIDGE! Could deception go further?

What will the Northern Douglas party say to this? Will they still denounce the Breckinridge men as disunionists for the purpose of misleading the people, and covering up their own traitorous intentions to the Democratic party and the Union?

While we have the subject in hand we will add a few more "choice extracts" from this Douglas organ, that the Democratic party in the North may be enabled to see the doctrines to be advocated and carried out, should Douglas ever be elected President. Here is a sample from the Douglas creed of the South:

We are for a perpetuation of the Union, provided the centrally laws, the compromise measures of 1850, and all subsequent compromises are repealed.

We regard the foregoing restrictions as unwarranted by the constitution, depriving, degrading, and grievously sectional in legislation to the South.

We are opposed to the acquisition of any new territory until the African slave trade is stopped, and the immediate and unconditional abolition of all Free negroes that are found within the limits of the Southern States.

These men are your fellow Democrats and most of them, no doubt, your friends at heart. They have been deceived and now prefer DOUGLAS but they must soon see that DOUGLAS has abandoned them—abandoned everything Democratic—and they will abandon him and vote with you in November. They do not desire to be separated from their fellow Democrats and no unkind measures, and no harsh language, should be used to estrange them from their party, or drive them, where their leaders are striving to take them, into the ranks of Black Republicanism. The defeat of the Democracy in this State should satisfy all that DOUGLAS is the enemy of their party, and that if they do not cut loose from him another defeat will follow in November.
