**The Late Elections.**  
The November elections have responded nobly to their predecessors of October. New York, New Jersey and Illinois have fallen into line with Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana, and the six great central States—the very heart of the country—have declared in thunder tones for the Constitution as it is and the Union as it was. The result of these elections proves the first dawn of hope for a united country in the future, and removes the possibility that every effort has been made, and to go rid of the effect you must remove the cause. This principle applies with full force to the troubles existing in our country since the Presidential election of 1860.

Reconciling the country on two antagonistic ideas, both in direct conflict with the Constitution, was the greatest need of our present calamity. A few turbulent and ambitious men, regardless of the peace of the country, and for the purpose of gaining political power for themselves, seized hold of a powerful political party in the free States and by pandering to the prejudices of the names who were ignorant of the designs of their leaders, succeeded in arranging the Northern States in an attitude of hostility to the South. They claimed power for the General Government and the people of the South, and against which the Supreme Court of the United States had pronounced its solemn decision. Their doctrine was old federalism intensified.

On the other hand a few reckless and wicked men in the Southern section of the country succeeded in sectionalizing the South, so as principally directly the opposite of the other party, and against which the Supreme Court of the United States had pronounced its solemn decision. This also was accomplished by pandering to the prejudices of the masses and imposing upon their credulity by plausible theories—the leaders all the time taking care to keep the people in ignorance of their real designs.

The country being thus divided through the agency of designing men in both sections, and against the solemn warning of the Supreme Court of the United States, the Southern States, in violation of the Constitution, seceded from the Union, and the Government of the United States was left in a state of anarchy. In the execution the executive power of the people of both sections, and the keeping of the peace, and the maintenance of the law, has been entrusted to the people of the North, but were overthrown by the popular phrenia of the hour. Their almost prophetic warnings were not heeded, and their earnest appeals to the executive to declare for their work of destruction, were laughed to scorn and treated with contempt.

Under these circumstances what was the duty of every patriot and friend of the country, who had been desired to see the Union restored to our fathers made it, and the supremacy of the Constitution maintained? We answer, the first great duty was to sustain the Government in its efforts to pass down armed rebellion by force of arms. This has been done by the people of the loyal States in a manner that has astonished the civil world. While the South of the first collision between the general Government and the rebellious States was yet receding through the country, the people of the loyal States, of all parties and creeds, rose as one man, to sustain the Government and the legally constituted authorities. Men and means without stint have been placed in the hands of the administration of Mr. Lincoln, and yet the civil war has not been terminated nor the rebellion suppressed. Why is this? Simply because the administration has been pursuing a wrong policy. Instead of cutting loose from those pernicious doctrines which have had so much to do with bringing these troubles upon the country, it has closely identified itself with them. Instead of adhering strictly to the Constitution as was its sworn duty, and pursuing a national and consistent policy, it has so far as to reassure the Southern people and induce them to rebel against the rebellion of Jeff. Davis & Co., it has blindly adhered to the worst kind of sectionalism, and thus drives the people of the South still further into the vortex of rebellion, into which they had been reluctantly drawn by their wicked and ambitious leaders. Thus has the administration been attempting the anomalous experiment of curing an evil by increasing its cause.

Had Mr. Lincoln discarded the counsel of Abolition fanatics at the commencement of his administration, and thus removed one cause of this war, we believe the Southern people, through their own voluntary action, would have hurried from power the disunionists and fire-eaters of the South with their ruinous theories and thus removed the other cause, making the restoration of the Union under the just and equitable principles of the old Constitution an easy matter.

The cause or causes of these troubles must be removed, so matter where they are located, whether in the North or South, or in both, before we can hope for a restoration of the Union and a future of peace and prosperity, and the sooner the people of the North, and all the people of the South, realize this fact the better for the whole country. The people of both sections have been governed by passion too long already. It is time they would stop and consider whether they are drifting, and apply the proper remedy for the evil with which our unhappy country is afflicted.

The Northern people have lately done what Mr. Lincoln should have done at the beginning of his administration but refused to do. They have prosecuted against Abolitionism as one of the great causes of this deplorable civil war, and hence we say, that the result of the recent Northern elections affords us a substantial ground of hope for a future restoration of our glorious Union. This strikes directly at the root of the matter. Let the Southern people, who have been impudently and arrogantly almost beyond endurance, by the designs of Jeff. Davis & Co., initiate our operations. Let them take advantage of the result of the Northern elections and the result of the old Union and the old Constitution.
